My lot is fall'n in that blest land Where God is truly known; He fills my cup with lib'ral hand; 'Tis he supports my throne.

This CM tune is found in many sources, and was composed for these words by Hugh Bond, born in Exeter in 1735 and Lay Vicar of Exeter Cathedral from 1762 until his death in 1792. He edited *Psalms of David in Metre* . . . The Music Consisting of the Tunes in present use (c.1796). A footnote in Thomas Hawkes's Collection of Tunes explains: 'FROME was composed to select verses of the 16th Psalm NV, and the Fugue in the second strain is so peculiar that out of 128 hymns of this class [i.e., CM] in the Wesleyan Collection only two . . . can be sung to it without dividing a word and injuring the sense. In the third line the Treble and Alto repeat the last four syllables. The Bass sings four syllables, and then repeats from the second syllable inclusive'. Thomas Hardy claimed the tune was a favourite with his mother, Jemima Hand, and included FROME in ten tunes he sent to the Society of Dorset Men in London, c.1910, but the setting he produced is unsatisfactory. This setting is from UTB collated with Hawkes.
